We had a wonderful time getting to know each other and singing traditional Christmas and New Year carols. We promised to visit again in the spring with our older students. Finally, we visited the mayor of Union to sing the traditional Greek kalanda to him and

his office staff, and we offered them a seasonal gift.

In January, we celebrated St. Basil and the New Year by cutting the **traditional Vasilopita**. Sincere thanks to the Philoptochos and the Greek School PTO for their support!

On **February 11**, we are very happy to be organizing **Godparents Sunday**. Godparents and Godchildren are invited to attend the Divine Liturgy and prepare to receive Communion together. After the service, our Sunday School will be treating everyone to breakfast in the church hall. Let us make this day a time to reflect on the blessings of Baptism and to nurture the holy relationship between Godparent and Godchild!

We are very proud of our older students who have been diligently serving our Lord and His Church as **Altar Servers and readers**. Congratulations for a great job!

PREK-GRADE 1
